Letter of Opposition

**SB 634 (Pérez) – The Right to Rest Act**

Dear Senator Umberg and Members of the Senate Judiciary Committee:

On behalf of the City of Torrance, I write to respectfully oppose SB 634 (Pérez), the Right to Rest Act. While we recognize and share the bill's intent to protect the dignity of individuals experiencing homelessness, we believe this legislation would undermine the compassionate and effective outreach strategies that are currently making a difference in our community.

The City of Torrance employs a service-first, housing-focused approach to addressing homelessness. Our outreach team—comprising three full-time Outreach Coordinators—works in partnership with our Police Department's Community Lead Officers to engage individuals experiencing homelessness through repeated, personalized interactions. We do not rely on enforcement to build trust; instead, we meet people where they are and help them take steps toward stability. For individuals with a connection to Torrance, we offer placement in our interim housing program, which includes case management and navigation services designed to transition clients into permanent housing.

While enforcement of local anti-camping ordinances is never our first step, having this tool available has proven essential in limited and challenging cases where individuals, after numerous outreach attempts, continue to decline services. The recent U.S. Supreme Court ruling affirming a jurisdiction's right to enforce such ordinances has reinforced this ability. According to our Outreach Coordinators, the ordinance has helped persuade some individuals to accept housing and services they had previously refused.

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The rationale for SB 634 suggests that fines and arrests harm unhoused individuals and obstruct their path to stability. In Torrance, we share these concerns, which is why enforcement is reserved for only the most difficult cases—and even then, we explore alternatives such as homeless courts that allow for dismissal of fines when individuals engage in services. Moreover, if a person is actively pursuing housing or working with a case manager, enforcement action is not taken.

SB 634 would strip cities like Torrance of the discretion we need to address public health and safety while continuing to serve our most vulnerable with compassion and care. We believe this bill is unnecessary and counterproductive to our mission of connecting unhoused individuals with meaningful support and permanent housing.

For these reasons, I respectfully urge you to oppose SB 634. Thank you for your consideration, and please feel free to contact my office should you have any questions or wish to learn more about our approach.
